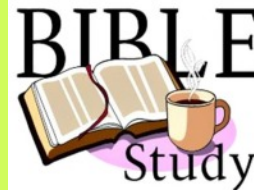

There's No Substitute!

'[Hidden] treasures ... riches stored in secret
places.'

Isaiah 45:3 NIV

When we're stressed - and who isn't nowadays? - often our first inclination is to consult the latest 'how to' book or DVD, or seek out the camaraderie of Christian friends. Reimar Schultze observes: 'At best we get a splash of what we're looking for. Time about God never replaces time with God. Look around your church and tell me whether with all the religious books, CDs, and programs, there are any [that] come up to the stature of Enoch, Abraham, Moses, and Noah. God Himself has been, and always will be the greatest source of information, inspiration, transformation, and fellowship ... Isaac was meditating in the fields when "he lifted up his eyes, and saw..." (Genesis 24:63 KJV). From being alone with God comes seeing ... in our quiet moments He sets before us gifts and delicacies ... hidden to the hurried man. The Bible says, "When [Jesus] had sent the multitudes away, he went up into a mountain apart to pray" (Matthew 14:23 KJV) ... Many who came to see Jesus traveled for days, yet He sent them away so He could pray. To get alone with God you have to send something away: relatives, friends, schedules ... opportunities ... other people's opinions. That was true with Jesus. Many were offended by Him. He didn't let people-pressure run His life; it was governed by His Father ... [You can] become a slave to man, or live to meet God's expectations. You can't do both. If you do the latter, streams of living water will flow from your innermost being, and you'll have power with God. He'll reveal to you "hidden treasures, riches stored in dark places". (UCB.CO.UK)

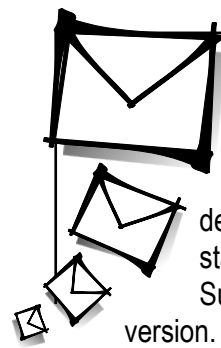

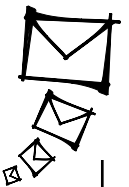


Dear Friends

What do you know about the story of Jonah in the Bible? Did you learn about it at school? I remember us doing a performance of the story and singing Jonah Man-Jazz with the line 'go down Jonah, deep in the ocean, go down Jonah, far from the shore, and that has stayed with me ever since. Maybe you can recall hearing the story in Sunday School. You might have seen it as a cartoon or watched a film version. Maybe you don't know the story at all and have no idea who Jonah is or what happened to him? And you might be wondering why I'm mentioning it!

June is a month dedicated by the Methodist Church as Bible month and this year the focus is on Jonah. Jonah was told by God to go to Ninevah (a city where the inhabitants were enemies of God's people) and to preach God's judgement to them. Jonah refused, got on a boat and went in the opposite direction. While on the boat a huge storm arose and the sailors were frightened, so in the end Jonah owned up to it being his fault and they threw him overboard. God sent a large fish to swallow up Jonah and after 3 days he was spat out onto the shore. Eventually he went to Ninevah and did what God asked and the people repented and turned to God. Jonah was angry and upset at God because he didn't feel the people deserved God's love and mercy.

Most people think the story is all about an almighty fish. Actually the story is not about an almighty fish but about an Almighty God. God calls Jonah, he pursues him and doesn't let him go, he causes a storm and calms a storm, he sends a whale and Jonah survives inside for 3 days. God causes the fish to expel Jonah and Jonah finally goes to Ninevah. Through Jonah God changes the hearts and minds of the people and they are saved. They were not condemned by God but became God's people. Whether we believe the story is fact or just an allegory, it still tells us of an Almighty God. It shows us a God whose love and grace and mercy extends to Jonah who initially let God down and also to the whole city of Ninevah. Jonah's words in the last chapter sum up what is at the heart of story 'I knew that you are a gracious and compassionate God, slow to anger and abounding in love, a God who relents from sending calamity.' Those are words about an Almighty God, not an almighty fish!

Gaming Review Announcement

A group of Churches and faith-based organisations have issued a welcome to the government's response to the review of fixed odds betting terminals (FOBTs). In a statement, the Salvation Army, the Methodist Church, the United Reformed Church, the Church of Scotland, the Baptist Union of Great Britain, the Evangelical Alliance UK, Quaker Action on Alcohol and Drugs, CARE and the Mission and Public Affairs Council of the Church of England said:

"FOBTs are a serious problem in society and for local communities, families and individuals. Evidence links them to patterns of addictive behaviour, large financial losses and anti-social and criminal behaviour. Today, we warmly welcome the government's commitment to cap maximum stakes on FOBTs at £2.

"We are clear that solving problem gambling goes much broader than responding to the challenge of FOBTs. We therefore welcome the player protection measures, being taken forward by the Gambling Commission.

"In welcoming this proposed action, we want to make it clear that in addition to the major challenge presented by FOBTs, there are also wider issues associated with gambling that require serious political commitment to address. Therefore, we note that at this stage new powers to oversee gambling are not been given to local authorities. We ask the government to re visit this.

"We also note that the government state that 'Gambling-related harm is a health Issue', and welcome the announcement that Public Health England (PHE) is to conduct an evidence review of health aspects of gambling-related harm to inform action on prevention and treatment."

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Ascension Day statement on overcoming religious intolerance

The President and Vice-President of the Methodist Conference, the Revd Loraine N Mellor and Jill Baker, have released the following statement to mark Ascension Day, when Christians celebrate Jesus Christ's ascension into heaven.

The month of May includes a number of important dates in the Christian calendar: Ascension Day, Pentecost and Trinity Sunday all fall within the same month this year. May 2018 also brings special days for those of other faiths including Shavuot for Jews, Wesak for Buddhists and Ramadan for Muslims.

We welcome these seasons and celebrations and send greetings of peace to our neighbours of all faiths in Britain, praying that this will be a time of deepening understanding of each other's traditions. We commend the ongoing work of the Big Iftar and of organisations including the Council of Christians and Jews and the Christian Muslim Forum who seek to build bridges in our communities.

Strong relationships, understanding and tolerance have never been more needed, in a world where intolerance and violence against other faith groups have become all too frequent. We grieve for the victims of recent violence targeted at Christians in the Middle Belt of Nigeria, of the terrorist attack on a church in Bangui, Central African Republic, and of the bombing of a mosque in Khost, Afghanistan. Sadly, these are only a few among many acts of violence targeted against believers including attacks and abuse directed at minority groups in our own country.

We stand at this time in solidarity with all people of faith who are subject to hatred, abuse and violence because of their beliefs. All people are made in God's image and, as we celebrate the ascension of our Lord, we pray that the day will come when no one will be persecuted for their faith.

Loving God, from earliest times you have heard the cry of your children for justice and for peace.

In these days of tension, of difficult remembrances, of competing voices and desperate cries, help us to hear the whisper of your Spirit, calling us to love, to service, to prayer and to compassion.

Open our ears to the voices of those with whom we disagree and our eyes to see how things look to them.

Give us confidence to stretch out our hands across difference and division.

Help us all, Gracious God, to be channels of your grace and your peace, wherever we may be.

Amen.

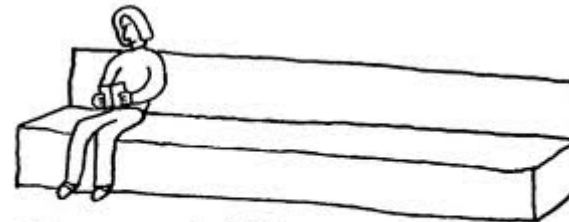
